Wisdom from the Ages

CCC 1045: Those who are united with Christ will form the community of the redeemed, "the holy city" of God, "the Bride, the wife of the Lamb." She will not be wounded any longer by the sine, stains, selflove,

that destroy or wound the earthly community. The beatific vision, in which God opens himself in an inexhaustible way to the elect, will be the ever-flowing wellspring of happiness, peace and mutual communion.

♦ What is a community you feel lifted up by? (Ideas: choir, band sports teams, youth group) How does that community make you feel supported?
◆ Have you ever compared yourself to another girl? How did it make you feel? How does that get in the way of stronger sisterhood?
◆ Living our faith in community is very important. Why do you think God wants us to journey in faith with other people?
♦ How do your words and actions impact others? What is a time that someone's words or actions had a positive or negative impact on you and how did it make you feel?

Invitation

As Fidelis sisters, we commit to a healthy and holy sisterhood. We lift one another up with our words and actions, and we honor our sisters for who they are because we see that Christ dwells within each of them. How can you personally commit to being a good Fidelis sister this year? Maybe it's being more aware of how your words impact others. Perhaps you feel called out of your comfort zone and can reach out to a girl who doesn't always have friends to sit with. Or maybe it's inviting a girl from church to be part of Fidelis. Pray about it. Ask God how he's calling you to grow in sisterhood this year, and then act on what he shares with you.

A virtue is an habitual and firm disposition to do the good. It allows the person not only to perform good acts, but to give the best of himself. The goal of a virtuous life is heaven/sainthood...therefore the Fidelis woman is virtuous.

Wisdom from the Ages

CCC 1803: The virtuous person tends toward the good with all his sensory and spiritual powers; he pursues the good and chooses it in concrete actions.

✦ How do your thoughts affect your actions? Do you notice that your actions change when you've been thinking about good things?
◆ Why is faith without works dead? How does this apply to virtue?
♦ What are some good habits you have already formed? What are some habits you'd like to form or bad habits you'd like to break?
◆ Share an example of a time you witnessed someone acting virtuously and how it affected you or someone you know.
Invitation
This week, write down a list of spiritual habits you want to develop. Maybe it's a daily Rosary, praying night prayer, going to Mass one extra day per week. After you brainstorm that list, pick ONE thing to try this week. Just one. Commit to that one action this week to practice growing in virtue. This activity will prepare you for your weekly invitations this year!
